SUFFRAGE PARADE HAD TRYING MARCH

Crowds Blocking Streets Charged by Police With Clubs at Washington

Washington, D. C., March 4.—The suffrage pageant moved up Pennsylvania avenue yesterday with great difficulty and surrounded with some danger. Crowds surged into the streets, completely overwhelming the police and stopping the pageant. Mounted police charged into the crowds, but failed at times to drive them back, even with the free use of clubs. In more than an hour the pageant had moved only ten blocks. Finally automobiles were brought into play, and with some of these the few police who accompanied the marchers began to buck the crowd. When the surging multitude was driven back in one place it flowed back into the street at another. The pageant slowly moved along, sometimes not more than a dozen feet at a time.

Inez Milholland, a New York society girl, mounted on a white horse and dressed as a herald, finally rode up beside a mounted policeman and helped to charge the crowd. Miss Milholland gesticulated and shouted at the mob and rode her horse into them with good effect. Finally some semblance of order was obtained, and while the crowds did break through the lines and surge down into the street, a narrow lane was preserved through which the procession slowly moved, frequently stopped, toward the tableaux on the treasury steps, and its termination at Constitution hall.

PROGRESS REPORTED OVER P. G. E. ROUTE

THOUSAND GRADERS STRUNG OVER LINE

Frazer River to Be Bridged About One Mile Below Lillooet

Vancouver, March 3.—"Construction work along the line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway in Lillooet district is making good progress. About a thousand graders are strung along the Fraser and Anderson lakes and across the 'Brokenhead summit' to 'within twelve miles of Pemberton Meadows,' said J. Callaghan, chief engineer who returned yesterday from a trip of inspection in that region.

"During my stay in the town of Lillooet which is located on the west bank of the Fraser I had a conference with the leading people and met their wishes by locating the depot site on a flat about a mile from the centre of the town and within a quarter of a mile of the river. The site is on Cayoosh Creek. An engineering party started last Friday to survey the extension of the line on the opposite side of the river. The Fraser river will be crossed by a 1,000-foot bridge over a mile below Lillooet. It will then follow the east bank of the Fraser for about twenty-three miles before swinging eastward to the table lands. The river will not be touched again until the vicinity of Quesnel is reached. The line as provisionally determined by preliminary surveys will ascend the upper reaches of the Bonaparte river after leaving the Fraser north of Lillooet. It will traverse the Lac La Hache Valley and the Williams Lake district before reaching Quesnel. Construction will be lighter than if we followed the Fraser all the way and in addition the route will open a fine ranching and mining country.

"North of Quesnel we will in a general way follow the Fraser, making frequent crossings and thus necessitating the construction of quite a number of bridges. The survey party now in the field will soon be augmented by four or five additional parties and the location of the line between Lillooet and the vicinity of Fort George, a distance of 250 miles will be rushed during the coming spring and summer. In addition to the work now in progress, west of the Fraser construction work will be pushed vigorously northward from Lillooet this summer on the east bank of the Fraser and on the west bank of the table lands. At some places the line will be over twenty miles from the Fraser."

EXTORTION THREATS MADE BY REBELS

Colonel Carranza Tells Foreigners in Mexico He Needs \$20,000

Washington, D. C., March 4.—Americans and other foreigners in Ciudad Portillo Diaz, Mexico, are threatened with extortion by Col. Carranza, a rebel, who has demanded \$20,000 to pay and feed his state volunteers. Col. Carranza, according to reports from Eagle Pass, Texas, says if the money is not forthcoming he will be responsible for the depredations his men may commit.

The consul at Chihuahua reports Governor Gonzalez still is detained for examination by a special court, although exonerated by a court-martial for complicity in a plot to resist the government. The whereabouts of Orcoz still are unknown in Chihuahua. Although the state of Coahuila is in revolt the state of Saitillo is quiet. Consul Holland reports sending automobiles to bring stranded Americans from Federal and Matheula to Saitillo.

HARVESTER PLANT TO WORK SHORT TIME

Hamilton, Ont., March 4.—General Superintendent Biggart of the International Harvester Company has authorized an announcement that he is signing at once the plant will go on short time, which means a schedule of five days a week, the men not working on Saturday. This will affect 2,500 employees. Mr. Biggart says that the company was forced to make this move on account of conditions in the west not coming up to expectations. The company has a lot of stock on hand.

HAYES LEAVES \$762,298.

Toronto, March 4.—The late C. M. Hayes, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, who was one of the victims of the Titanic disaster, left estate valued for probate at \$762,298, the greater portion of which was in stocks and real estate. A year before his death he settled an income on each of his four daughters, who by the will receive bequests of \$10 each. There were other bequests to relatives and friends.

WANDERED TO DEATH.

Lacknow, Ont., March 4.—Mrs. Nell McCorties, aged 76, living alone, was found from home late Wednesday afternoon. Sunday morning a search party found her dead in a field three miles from the town.

FORTY-ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS ARE STOLEN

Banks Notified to Watch for Large Bills Taken From Mrs. Mabel Mills

Chicago, March 3.—Chicago and Evanston police officials co-operated today in investigating the mysterious disappearance of \$41,000, which was either lost or stolen from Mrs. Mabel Mills, wife of a wealthy real estate dealer of San Antonio, Texas. Mrs. Mills is in a serious condition at an Evanston hospital, due to a wound on the back of her head, which she received either from a blow dealt by robbers or a fall. She was found on the doorstep of Mrs. A. J. Cooper, in Evanston, and removed to a hospital, where she was revived and told the police a story of having drawn \$45,000 from a Chicago bank on Saturday and spending \$2,000 on a shopping tour in State street, and then dining with a woman friend in Evanston. She said she suffered intensely from the cold when she started back to Chicago, and that she had no recollection of how she lost the money.

When the woman was found she was unconscious and her pocketbook was open. Notice has been sent to every bank in the country to watch for the \$1,000-bills lost by Mrs. Mills. The money lost or stolen from the victim was in \$1,000-bills.

SEVERAL INJURED IN OWEN SOUND SMASH

Accident on Grand Trunk Line Regarded as One of Worst Recorded

Wanover, Ont., March 4.—One of the worst wrecks in the history of Owen Sound branch of the G. T. P. occurred about a mile north of the town yesterday. One of the injured, Geo. Cole, news agent of Chesley, is most seriously hurt, with his left elbow broken and internal injuries. The others are: Conductor Hill, London, face cut and one hand badly burned; Conductor Dinan, Owen Sound, chest crushed and slight wounds; Robert Irwin, engineer, legs and head injured; Chas. Argue, fireman, face and body hurt; James Greaves, engineer, slightly hurt; A. E. Warning, fireman, ind. not slight; W. H. Harris, London, baggage man, left rib broken; T. B. Thompson, brakeman, head cut. Several passengers were shaken up.

ALASKA LEGISLATURE AT FIRST MEETING

Senator Ray President and Representative Collins Chosen Speaker

Juneau, Alaska, March 4.—The first Alaska territorial legislature met at noon Monday in Elk's hall. A senate caucus had already chosen Senator L. V. Ray as president of the senate, and John E. Marshall chief clerk. The House caucus had chosen Representative E. B. Collins as speaker. The legislature has not power to permit lotteries or gambling, to relax the federal liquor laws, to create a territorial debt or to license corporations that do business outside of the territory. By express provision of congress the legislature may grant woman suffrage.

HODGES WILL RETURN AFTER PERU CONTRACT

Vancouver, March 4.—Advice has been received here that A. B. W. Hodges, formerly general superintendent of the Granby Consolidated, with headquarters at Grand Forks, will leave Lima, Peru, March 11, for this city, his three years term as general manager of the famous Cerro de Pasco mine in the Andes having expired. Mr. Hodges has been earning a salary of \$5,000 gold a year. He will be accompanied north by Mrs. Hodges who was a great social favorite during her ten years residence in the upper country. It is understood that Mr. Hodges will locate here or in Victoria and devote his time to consultation work.

The other day, in a street car, a woman across the aisle from us leaned forward and informed the woman in front of her that part of her waist was unbuttoned.

Naturally, the lady was extremely embarrassed at this discovery, but not too much embarrassed to thank her informant with the most evident gratitude and the most cordial good manners.

"Well, now," said my seat companion, as the lady with the unbuttoned waist successfully hid it by slipping on her coat, "I've been watching that waist for the last five minutes and wondering if I'd better tell her about it, but I didn't quite dare to because you never can tell just how people will take anything like that."

Do you know, I think there are a great many people in the world like this woman. They come right to the brink of kind acts, and then hang back because of some scruple or other. They are afraid of being misunderstood; they are afraid of being unconventional; they are afraid of being conspicuous; and so they hang back, and the opportunity passes.

What woman struggling with a heavy suitcase has not sometimes looked wistfully at the broad shouldered men swinging past her, and wished that one of them would offer to carry the burden that to him would be no burden at all?

We were speaking of this matter, and this is what an unquestionably kind-hearted man had to say. "Yes, I often think I'd like to help some woman when I see her struggling along, but I'm always afraid she'll think I'm trying to pick up an acquaintance."

As if any woman worth the name would not accept such assistance properly if it were offered in the proper manner!

I have seldom denied a kind impulse without regretting it. Once upon a time I wanted very much to invite a new neighbor into my home on Christmas eve. She was alone, and I felt she must be lonely. But just because I did not know her very well, and because she had a little more money than the rest of us, I was afraid.

Later in our friendship I told her about it, and when I asked her if she really was lonely that night, the tears stood in her eyes. "Oh, my dear," she said "I'm glad you don't know how lonely."

That experience has made me more willing to brave the danger in kind impulses. And after all, what is the danger? A rebuff. But that will hurt him who gives it far more than you. We often know that there will be unpleasant consequences if we yield to our impulses, and yet, how easily we yield! How is this for a resolution—to be as afraid of our wrong impulses as we have been of the kind ones, and to yield to the kind impulses as easily as we have to the wrong.

DRIVEWAY WILL BE PAVED SOON

PAVING AND LIGHTING UNDERTAKEN TOGETHER

Health Conditions at Foul Bay Camps Leads to Complaint From Health Officer

The grading and concreting of the Ross Bay seawall driveway will be undertaken by day labor, on the recommendation of the city engineer, who mentioned that he had talked the matter over with the mayor, and contracts will be let for the asphalt paving after tenders have been received. The balloting of the draft will also be undertaken by day labor at the present time. These decisions were reached at the meeting of the city council last evening.

The cost of the roadway will be approximately \$30,000, and of the ballustrade, \$10,000.

The project will be one of the works undertaken as a means of finding employment for men requiring to be engaged during the slack season.

Alderman Gleason mentioned that there was to the credit of the loan some \$57,600.

Later it was reported by the electric light committee that the cost of installing arc lamps on the roadway in front of the cemetery was \$3,400, and \$2,000 for an extension to Clover point.

Alderman Houston explained that the cost of underground work would be \$2,000.

The engineer's report was then adopted, and the item with regard to lighting also, subject to an opinion from the city solicitor that the work

can be done out of that fund, was also passed.

Foul Bay Campers.

The campers at Foul Bay are between the devil and the deep sea, and literally between the city officials and the broad waters of the strait of Juan de Fuca.

Last week the fire chief drew the attention of the council to the danger from fire through the stove pipes used for chimneys, and last night the medical officer of health, Dr. G. A. B. Hall, took the question up from the health standpoint, pointing out that the places had no sewer connection.

On the suggestion of Alderman McCandless the city engineer will submit the estimate of providing a sewer on the beach, with which the tents and shacks may be connected.

Sooke Harbor Bill.

The second city member, H. B. Thomson, M. P. P., and the city engineer will be formally thanked for services rendered in the passage of the Sooke Harbor Water Company's private bill, in watching the city's interest in what was described as a "matter which had slipped through last year's council," according to Mayor Morley.

Protests Against Location.

Two further protests against a permit being granted to the Hinton Electric Company for a boat factory on Victoria Harbor, but outside the factory area, were read from W. S. Bond and A. J. Mackenzie, and tabled till the application is submitted by the applicants.

A building permit will be granted to William Martin for a stable for five horses on Bridge street, within one of the factory areas.

Award Forage Contract.

The council determined to award the contract for forage to the Brackman-Ker Milling Company, in view of both the Sylvester Feed Company and Vancouver Milling Company having declined to accept the tenders for part of the contract as awarded to them.

Garland street is to be carried through to Cedar Hill road, as soon as plans are prepared showing the land which will be required to be expropriated.

TO MAKE CONNECTION AT HARRIETT ROAD

WATERWORKS QUESTION IS SETTLED AT LAST

Problem About Paying for Steel Plate Arises Again

The connection of the city water mains with the Goldstream supply of the Esquimalt Waterworks Company at Harriett road is to be made without further delay. This decision was reached by the city council last evening after hearing a report from the water commissioner on the subject, and further consideration of the various reports which have been tabled from time to time on the subject.

There was little discussion on the subject, the mayor expressing the opinion that the connection should be effected as early as possible, and arrangements made with the Esquimalt company to purchase water earlier than the provisional date agreed upon.

Mr. Rust stated in his report that in his opinion the Westholme Lumber Company would not finish the main to Parson's Bridge on time. He therefore advised providing immediately for the additional supply in face of the low water at Elk lake and the rapidly increasing daily demand with the advent of better weather.

Position of City.

Water Commissioner Rust stated he is not in favor of the city taking over the work of laying this Sooke main to Parson's Bridge. "The city has no organization for this work, nor proper equipment, and to rush the work under such circumstances would entail a large additional cost." The construction of camps would have to be undertaken, and supplies procured, involving an immediate heavy expenditure which the city would find burdensome, and it is a question whether many of the city's unemployed who reside in the city, would care to engage in this work which necessitates living in camps. The Westholme Lumber Company could carry on this work as efficiently and as rapidly as could the city.

No Further Rise.

The Commissioner remarked that the cost of making the connection across the Arm at Harriett road to connect with the Esquimalt Waterworks Company's system at Arm street, would be about \$100,000, of which \$2,000 will be returned in the value of the pipe when this connection is discontinued.

"The conditions at Elk lake have not improved during the past winter," Mr. Rust advised the council after the inspection of Saturday. "The water in Elk lake has risen but two feet since November 1 last, and there is no likelihood of any further rise, and the level at the lake will shortly commence to go down. The amount of water used at the present time is slightly under four million gallons per twenty-four hours; and just now a large number of the flush tanks for sewer purposes are either reduced or cut off, and very little water is used for street flushing, and no lawn sprinkling has yet been necessary. Within the next two months, however, the daily consumption will very greatly increase, and by June 1 next, there will be but very little water in the narrows between Elk lake and Beaver lake. If the connection with the Esquimalt Waterworks Company is not made before that date, considerable expenditure in installing a pump at Elk lake to lift the water into Beaver lake, would be necessary, but as soon as the water is available from the Esquimalt Waterworks Company's system, it would be possible to conserve a certain amount of water in Elk lake."

Only Just Starting.

He stated that the Westholme Lumber Company, though it asked for three weeks within which to show what it could do to provide for the Parson's Bridge connection, started only a week ago to make pipe and up to Saturday last had manufactured about 350 feet. The output would be largely increased as the company appears to have a fairly well-equipped shop, but, with the results, he could not see how it is possible to manufacture about 23,000 feet of pipe, have it dipped, tested and ready for use before July 1 at the earliest. The dipping tank will not be in operation for a few days, and no dip-coating for the pipe has yet been ordered. The rate of pipe-laying will be largely governed by the rate of trenching. Some of the valves or fittings have yet to be ordered by the company and it will take probably three months before they arrive, and, in addition, the company has for field riveting but one small air compressor, whereas, to rush the work, four riveting gangs should be employed.

Under the agreement made with the Esquimalt Waterworks Company the city is to commence taking water from the company early in April and, accordingly, he strongly urged the council not to delay the matter further, otherwise the lack of an adequate supply of water will prove nothing short of disastrous.

Worse Every Time.

"It gets a little worse every time," said Alderman Porter, when a letter was read from Evans, Coleman & Evans, Limited, with regard to the shipment of plates and rivets sent to Tethys Cove in January, in which the company objected to the contractors for Sooke lake using the plate till arrangements are made to pay for it. They asked the council to consider the matter at once, and the subject will be taken up by the finance committee.

TERMS OF SETTLEMENT WITH GREAT NORTHERN

City Prepares Statement of Details of Release in Victoria & Sidney Railway Case

A letter has been drafted by the finance committee of the city council conveying the terms of the agreement for the transfer of the city's interest in the Victoria & Sidney railway to the Great Northern railway.

Alderman Cuthbert, chairman of the legislative committee, presented a draft arrangement for sanction by the council giving a release of the city's interest, and this was adopted by the city council last evening.

The following are the suggested terms: 1. Immediate cash payments to the city and province respectively of \$45,000 and \$30,000, together with any interest paid since January 17 last.

2. Guaranty of the Victoria, Vancouver & Eastern Railway Company indemnifying the city and province respectively against all future payments of interest on the said bonds.

3. The undertakings of the Victoria & Sidney Railway Company and the Victoria, Vancouver & Eastern Railway Company that the Victoria & Sidney railway line will hereafter be operated in connection with the Great Northern railway system so as to enable through traffic to be routed between all points on the Great Northern railway system and the city of Victoria.

4. The questions of service and betterment being subject to the control of the minister of railways under the provisions of the Railway Act; the city will be content to let the same be dealt with by the minister of railways, subject to the provisions of the Railway Act, and in accordance with the order which has already been issued by the minister of railways in that connection, and such other arrangements as may be made with the approval of the provincial government for a fast passenger service by a thoroughly modern up-to-date gasoline electric passenger car to be operated upon said railway line.

Alderman Gleason again supported the adoption of the terms.

His worship mentioned that the agreement should provide to abandon the track south of Fisguard street, about which there has been much contention in the past two years.

Alderman Cuthbert said that the provision was made in the memorandum of the provincial government concerning betterments, so that they had not covered it on the occasion.

The report was adopted, subject to the addition of this clause.


RETURN IS MADE ON PAVING CONTRACTS

Large Amount of Work Has Been Finished, but Quantity Remains Yet

The situation with regard to the paving contracts, and the amount of expropriation still to be done under widening schemes, for which Alderman Gleason recently asked through a return from the city engineer, was made public at the council meeting last evening, and copies will be distributed among the aldermen.

Mr. Rust submitted the following report: "The streets under contract for paving but not yet started total 99,000 square yards; those partially completed have yet some 38,600 yards to be finished; streets for which by-laws have been passed and ready for the work to proceed total 17,400 square yards, but there are, under this head, a number of streets for which by-laws have been passed but upon which the underground work has not been completed, aggregating 122,800 square yards."

As to the various parcels of land yet to be expropriated for street improvements the city engineer did not make a statement as his department has not been charged with keeping track of that work, and there appears to be no records in any other department. Accordingly he suggested that an accurate record should be kept, in either the comptroller's or city solicitor's office on expropriations.

BODWELL REPRESENTS BRITISH COLUMBIA

ATTORNEY-GENERAL WILL PRESENT PROVINCE'S CASE

E. P. Davis and Charles Wilson to Be Senior and Junior Counsel on Better Terms

Now that the provincial cabinet members are at leisure—speaking comparatively—with the session concluded, the much discussed question of better terms for the province, about which so much was heard during the recent provincial and Dominion elections, comes to the front again. It was stated in the House during the session that the government was soon to make an announcement regarding the appointment of the British Columbia member of the joint Dominion and Provincial commission which is to investigate the whole question of the annual subsidy from the Ottawa administration.

The British Columbia commissioner will be E. S. Bodwell, K. C., of Victoria. The case for the province will be presented by Hon. W. J. Bowser, K. C., M. P., the attorney-general. With the attorney-general, E. P. Davis, K. C., and Charles Wilson, K. C., both of Vancouver, will be associated; the former as senior and the latter as junior counsel.

Mr. Bodwell's political experience in the province warrants his selection, the well-known K. C. having a special knowledge of the workings of the British North America Act. Mr. Davis is one of the leading criminal lawyers of Canada, and with Mr. Wilson, a former attorney-general, is an expert in equity cases.

Sources of Revenue. The sources of revenue from the Dominion government are as follows: Annual Payment of Interest, Annual Subsidy, Annual Per-Capita Grant based upon population, Annual Payment for Provincial Lands Conveyed to the Dominion Government; and in addition, since 1907, a further annual subsidy of \$100,000, which the present provincial government wishes to have still further increased.

Until 1907, when the British North America Act was amended so as to provide for the annual subsidy last mentioned, the only revenue from that source was based upon the first four items.

In the fiscal year 1902-03 the aggregate revenue from these sources was \$308,184.66. This revenue decreased during the succeeding years, by one thousand dollars; the item on which the reduction was made being the Per-Capita Grant. In 1907 the Laurier government consented to an amendment of the British North America Act by which the provincial revenue was increased by an annual special grant of \$100,000. In that year the annual subsidy given to all the provinces was proportionately increased from \$35,000 to \$150,000 so that in addition to that increase the \$100,000 was a separate bonus to this province. In 1907 the Dominion revenue, then, increased to \$322,976.66.

Nearly One Million. Since 1907 the revenue was stationary until the fiscal year 1911-12, when the Per-Capita Grant increased to \$294,629.66. So that during the last year for which the public accounts have been made up, British Columbia drew from the Ottawa treasury nearly

one million dollars, the figures being \$112,787.66. The revenue of this province is more than that of all the Maritime provinces put together and the expenditure this year is more than double. Since the matter of an increase in the special subsidy is one in which the eastern provinces have to decide, if it is said there is very little likelihood of any increase being secured, even should the joint commission make such a recommendation.

When the dominion and provincial representatives on the joint commission are gazetted they will select a third, an independent member. Should they fail to agree on this the appointment rests with the Colonial Office in London.

VOTERS' LEAGUE WILL MEET THE COUNCIL

Question of Employment of Labor in Esquimalt Will Come Up Friday

A letter was received by the Esquimalt council last night from Secretary Turner of the Voters' League, asking that an appointment be made for a deputation from the Voters' League to interview the council upon the matter of complaints which were being made about the employment of labor.

"Why should we meet them?" asked Col. Peters. "Our board of works appoints our men, and it is supposed to be competent. Why should we see anybody? We're here to employ whom we see fit."

"The writer is a ratepayer," suggested Reeve Saunders, "and as such has a right to have himself heard."

"The writer is one of the employees," said Councillor Anderson.

The fixing of a date was next discussed, and the Friday night meeting of the works committee was decided upon.

"Then I shan't be here," said Col. Peters. "This is getting too heavy, meeting twice a week. I don't see why we should meet specially to see these men."

"But Friday is the night the works committee meets," the Reeve explained.

"Well, is the whole council on the works committee?" asked the colonel. When it was explained to him that this was so, Col. Peters repeated that two nights a week was too much.

The nature of the complaint is not known to the councillors, as all the men are being paid the \$3.00 a day demanded by the Voters' League at the last election.
